The student is expected to self-select text and read independently for a sustained period of time.</p>	<b>4A—Read independently.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><i>Scope</i> is full of high-interest articles and stories that students are often thrilled to choose for independent reading.</li> </ul>

	<b>6D—Paraphrase and summarize texts.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The Summarizing activity (on two levels) in the Core Skills Workout with every issue guides students to summarize texts.</li> </ul>
	<b>6E—Interact with sources.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Ideas provided in the lesson plans suggest varied and creative ways students can interact with sources.</li> </ul>
	<b>6F—Respond using newly acquired vocabulary.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Vocabulary practice activities and vocabulary slideshows prompt students to use new vocabulary in context.</li> <li>Writing prompts require students to incorporate newly acquired vocabulary in their responses.</li> </ul>

	<b>8B—Analyze elements of poetry.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Four issues each year feature a poem on its own for analysis. Other issues may include poetry as a text pairing for a feature article.</li> <li>• Lesson plans and activities help students analyze the effect of structural and graphical elements of poetry and write their own poems.</li> </ul>
	<b>8C—Analyze how playwrights develop characters and dramatic action.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The plays in every issue familiarize students with the elements and structure of drama (dialogue, staging, scenes, acts, etc.) and how playwrights use them to develop characters and dramatic action.</li> </ul>
	<b>8D—Analyze characteristics and structures of informational text.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Narrative nonfiction features, paired texts, and short informational text articles are included in every issue.</li> <li>• Close-reading questions prompt thinking and discussion on characteristics and structural elements such as key ideas and details, text features, and text structure.</li> <li>• The Core Skills Workout with every issue includes skills activities on text features and text structure.</li> </ul>
	<b>8E—Analyze characteristics and structures of argumentative text.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Debate feature presents a debate on a hot-button topic for kids in one of two formats: Essay Kit or Scavenger Hunt.</li> <li>• Both formats help students analyze characteristics and structures of argumentative text, such as identifying the claim, evidence, and counterargument.</li> </ul>

	<b>11D—Compose correspondence.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Writing prompts at the end of features and activities with in-role writing tasks often instruct students to compose a letter to a person, group, or fictional character.</li> </ul>
